Annual Convocation celebrates achievements of Honors graduates

The University Honors Program Convocation was held Friday, May 7, 2010, in the memorable Metropolitan Memorial United Methodist Church near the American University campus.

The ceremony recognizes Honors graduates for their accomplishments during their time at AU, and includes a presentation of the Honors medallion that represents each student's commitment to academic excellence. The medal becomes part of graduates' regalia worn at their school or college Commencement. Students who have won an Honors Capstone Research Conference Award or Honorable Mention are also recognized.

For the second year, the ceremony incorporated a student speaker. This year, Rachel Cannon (SIS '10) was selected from the Honors seniors who competed to write and deliver the Convocation's student speech. Rachel's speech described the many definitions of power, reminding graduates that, while individual power may carry wealth and influence, the collective power of community may be a more important form of power, given its ability to shape each of its individual members. In her well-delivered remarks, Rachel challenged graduates to remember the Honors community they were a part of during their time at American, and to recall these roots while striving for excellence in the future. The message was inspiring and will likely resonate for years to come.

Honors alum tells of applying AU learning in role as assistant district attorney

After graduating from the School of International Service at American University in 2003, I spent six years obtaining a master's degree (Harvard University, '06) and a juris doctor (University of Wisconsin, '09). While I was completing my master's degree, my work focused on South Asian religions, particularly Hinduism, Islam, and Buddhism. I entered law school planning to do a concentration in international law. After one year of law school, an internship at an international corporate law firm in Bangkok and studying abroad in the Netherlands, I realized that while I love to travel and experience other cultures, my professional passion lay in a very different area: prosecution. Ultimately, I finished law school with a concentration in criminal law and am now an assistant district attorney at the Wood County District Attorney's Office in Wausau, Wisconsin. My caseload, which includes felonies, as well as misdemeanors and traffic violations, is challenging but also quite engaging.

When I graduated from SIS, I believed my career would eventually lead to international law in the public sector. In the future, I hope my work leads back to the international sphere, perhaps

combining my interest in South Asia with my experience in prosecution. For the time being, my knowledge of international relations and cross-cultural dialogue is most readily applied in criminal cases with defendants who are immigrants, Hmong, and Native Americans.

Life is full of surprises, though there are some constants. I still enjoy traveling, learning new languages (I'm about to tackle Spanish), and keeping up with the world news. I know that regardless where life takes me, the time I spent studying the world at AU's culturally diverse campus has shaped the way that I view the world and the individual circumstances of each person with whom I interact.

Honors conference showcases range of student research

Academic excellence, wide-ranging research and innovative presentations were on full display at this year's Honors Capstone Research Conference. It's the only student research conference on campus where undergraduates from all disciplines and all schools can – and do – participate, and the 2010 conference was bigger and better than ever.

Each spring, Honors students who have completed or are finalizing a Capstone project are invited to apply to present at this day-long conference, held this year on April 14. A field of more than 80 applicants – the largest ever – was narrowed to 40 presentations, 20 of which were given orally and another 20 in poster formats.

From a board game designed to teach players about U.S. presidential elections to a Lego-inspired Chinese translation instruction video, the poster

presentations represented

a broad spectrum of student interests and academic disciplines, many using new and innovative presentation formats. Oral presentations ranged from highly scientific, such as CAS senior Bill Flynn's presentation, "Effective 4- and Higher-Body Interactions of Neutral Bosons in Optical Lattices," to creative works like Steven Tringali's (SOC '10) music video Capstone project.

Thirty AU faculty and administrators served as judges for the Honors Capstone Research Conference. After careful and difficult deliberations, they chose three oral and three poster presentations to receive the Honors Capstone Research Conference Award. They awarded six more students with an Honorable Mention. These students were each given special recognition at the 2010 Honors Convocation and on the Honors website.
