**GETTING A MORE SUBSTANTIVE INTERNSHIP:** The following sites offer terrific opportunities and have well-earned reputations. But it's your responsibility to make sure that you get the most from your internship. For example:

- Get a job description first so you and your employer are BOTH clear on the expectations for the semester.
- Have a clear understanding of the channels of communication for questions, concerns, and clarifications.
- Ask for feedback, particularly at the mid-point of the semester as well as towards the end.
- Take initiative! Never rest on your laurels or spend the afternoon IM-ing!
- Ask for a letter of reference *before* you leave.

**GETTING ACADEMIC CREDIT:** If your internship is no more than 15% clerical work, you may want to register for academic credit. An internship for credit is like a class, with a syllabus and assignments. The parameters vary by department, but in general, for-credit internships must be done over at least a twelve-week period of time and to earn 3 credit hours, you should be working at least 15 hours a week. Students must be at least a sophomore, or a transfer or graduate student, with at least one semester completed at American University.

**TAKING ADVANTAGE OF YOUR TUITION-PAID CAREER CENTER:** The Career Center offers to support before, during, and after internships including advice on seeking internships, advice on applying (including resumes, interviews, and follow up), problem-solving on the job, and incorporating internships into the resume.
