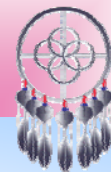

The Festival began six years ago as part of the annual November American Indian Heritage month activities of the Indian Health Service Heritage Committee. It is a day packed with information on Native American culture, both contemporary and historical. A variety of activities represent the authentic Native American culture of the United States. Experience traditional memorial ceremonies, Native American artwork, artifacts and traditional regalia, vendors, tribal foods, a mini-Pow Wow, and much more!
The Festival is free and open to the public – rain or shine.

The event is co-sponsored by the Indian Health Service (IHS), a Federal agency headquartered in Rockville and Montgomery County, serving American Indians and Alaska Natives across the United States; the City of Rockville; the Montgomery Office of the County Executive; the Montgomery County Library System; and the oldest American Indian organization in the metro area—the American Indian Society (AIS) of Washington, D.C.
