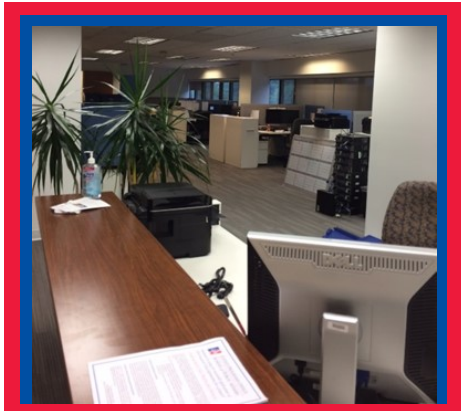


# JPO Monthly

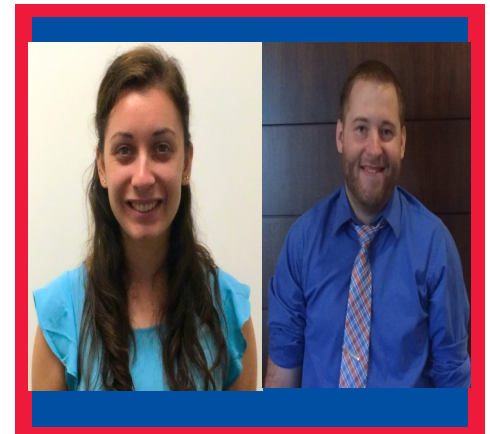
## We've Moved!

## State Administering Agencies Update

JPO staff attended the National Criminal Justice Association’s annual conference in Philadelphia, Pennsylvania. Held August 6 – 9, the focus of the conference was on Integrating Policy, Research and Technology to Improve Public Safety. Topics included law enforcement assisted diversion to implementing evidence-based practices, strategies for combatting the opioid epidemic, jail diversion for those suffering from mental illnesses, juvenile justice initiatives, and using risk assessments. While at the conference, JPO staff also hosted a breakfast table and engaged conference attendees in discussions on the Right to Counsel Initiative.
