Welcome and Introductions	Jason Millison opened the meeting and handed the floor to the co-chairs, Jerry Gallucci and Matthew Bennett. Jerry Gallucci noted that this is the first full membership meeting of the Partnership, the importance of gathering all together, and hearing from all the working groups. Matthew Bennett opened by thanking Jerry and the team at Mary Graydon for hosting the meeting. Matt emphasized the value that AU brings to the neighborhood as a place of gathering, celebration, and most importantly, academics. He introduced the night's guest speaker, Amy Dacey, who is the executive director of the Sine institution of Policy and Politics.
Remarks from Amy Dacey	

	 Amy Dacey introduced herself as the Executive Director of the Sine Institute of Policy and Politics at American University. She has a personal connection to AU as an alum and current neighbor. The Sine Institute focuses on policy and politics, aiming to bring different perspectives together to foster robust conversations and find common ground on important issues. The Institute's programs include Fellows program that brings in diverse experts to work with students Distinguished lecturer series Annual youth poll to engage young voters and understand their views on long-term societal issues Certificate leadership programs and training sessions for students The Sine Institute's youth poll has provided valuable insights, such as finding that 82% of young people don't believe the U.S. has a strong democracy currently. The Institute creates events and programming that address timely, relevant topics and encourage civic engagement and understanding. Dacey emphasized the Institute's goal of convening, communicating, and collaborating with the broader community, not just the university.
Partnership and Working Group Overview	 Link to the Sine Institute's website: https://www.american.edu/sine-Institute/ Jonathan McCann, Co-Chair of the Facilities and Planning Working Group, provided an overview of the working group's duties and objectives: The Facilities Planning Working Group collaborates on issues related to physical campus facilities, existing campus developments, and general project status reporting and updates. The group discusses zoning ordinance compliance and conditions, such as those related to the Jacobs Field sound barrier and construction management plans. The group provides transparency and advance notice on further processing application matters, allowing for collaborative discussing sustainable infrastructure projects, opportunities with older buildings, and the priorities of the new university president. Phillip Morse, Co-Chair of the Student Life and Safety Working Group, provided an overview of the working group's duties and objectives:

	• The Student Life Working Group focuses on educating students on how to
	be good citizens and neighbors, including educating them on local
	ordinances and the university's conduct code.
	• The group is involved in community building efforts, encouraging students
	to interact with neighbors as they live in the surrounding neighborhoods.
	• They work closely with the Dean of Students office to ensure any student
	conduct issues are addressed through an educational, rather than purely
	punitive, approach.
	Josh Finver, Co-Chair of the Transportation and Parking Working Group, provided
	an overview of the working group's duties and objectives:
	The Transportation and Darking Working Crown has feaured on issues
	The Transportation and Parking Working Group has focused on issues
	around scooters and policies for their use on and around campus, including the installation of new scooter stations.
	• They provide updates on upcoming special events like commencement,
	move-in, etc. to help coordinate and communicate with the community.
	• The group reviews the annual Transportation Demand Management (TDM)
	report to the District Department of Transportation, sharing metrics on the
	university's efforts.
	• The group has had discussions around the Spring Valley building and the
	OLLI neighborhood program, working to address community feedback and
	fulfill the university's obligations.
	Elizabeth Deal, Co-Chair of the Engagement and Communications Working Group,
	provided an overview of the working group's duties and objectives:
	• The Engagement and Communications Working Group works closely with
	the community relations team to gain insights into community priorities
	and better serve the entire neighborhood.

	provide a range of experiences for community members to connect with
	AU.
