The American University Black Swing Voter Project surveyed 1,215 Black respondents, including an overweight of 593 18-29 year olds, from the 2020 electoral battleground states of Wisconsin, Michigan, Pennsylvania, North Carolina, Florida, and Georgia. The African American Research Collaborative conducted the online survey from July 1-9. The sample is weighted to the population of Black/African American adults in each state, and by gender, age, and education. The margin of sampling error for the full sample is less than or equal to \pm 3 percent. However, percentages based on sub-samples of the survey have larger margins of sampling error. Specifically, for example, the margin of sampline error for the candidate preference question is \pm 4 percent; Likewise, the margin of sampling error for percentages reported among just those under 30, and just those 30-59, is also \pm 4 percent. The margin of sampling error for percentages reported among just those 60 and over is \pm 8 percent. Finally, the margin of sampling error for the percentage of those respondents who indicate that choosing a Black vice-presidential running mate would make them more likely to turnout for Biden is \pm 6 percent.
