MOVING TO WASHINGTON, D.C.



Moving to Washington, D.C., opens up a wealth of opportunities to experience a city rich in culture and history. The School of Public Affairs (SPA) at American University is located in Tenleytown, a charming neighborhood in the upper northwest part of the city, making it a convenient hub for students with easy access to various parts of D.C., Virginia, and Maryland. The area offers diverse housing options, from lively urban neighborhoods to quieter suburban settings.



Finding housing in D.C. can be challenging due to the higher cost of living compared to other cities, so it's important to be prepared and proactive. Visiting in person is essential for making the best choice, as it allows you to meet potential roommates or landlords and to check the quality and safety of the property and neighborhood. You may need to make multiple visits to secure a place, but the effort is worthwhile for peace of mind during your studies. SPA offers guidance on finding housing, although it does not directly arrange accommodations for students.

Get to Know Washington, D.C.

For those new to D.C., it is a city that offers a wide range of experiences—from iconic landmarks and museums to vibrant nightlife and diverse communities. Exploring the city and its neighborhoods will help you find a good fit for your lifestyle. Resources like dc.gov, washingtonpost.com, yelp.com/dc, and washingtonian.com can be great starting points.

Nearby Airports

- Ronald Reagan Washington National Airport (DCA): Located closest to downtown D.C.,
 Reagan National is a popular choice for its convenience, though flights might be pricier compared to other airports. Check wmata.com for Metro options to and from the airport.
- Washington Dulles International Airport (IAD): About 26 miles west of D.C., Dulles now has a Metro stop, which makes access easier. Its website offers comprehensive information for travelers.
- Baltimore-Washington International Airport (BWI): Located about 40 minutes from D.C., BWI offers another travel option.

Each airport offers distinct benefits depending on your travel preferences and budget.

GETTING AROUND WASHINGTON, D.C.



Navigating Washington, D.C., can be a unique experience, especially for those new to the city. The District's layout, combined with its traffic patterns and parking rules, can make driving challenging. Many newcomers find that public transportation offers a more straightforward way to explore and get around the city.

Getting Oriented in D.C.

Understanding the city's design can make finding your way much easier. D.C. is divided into four quadrants—Northwest (NW), Northeast (NE), Southeast (SE), and Southwest (SW)—with the U.S. Capitol at the center. The city's streets follow a grid system:

- Numbered Streets: Run north-south.
- Lettered Streets: Run east-west, starting with "A" and skipping certain letters like "J," "X," and "Z." When the alphabet ends, street names move to two and three-syllable words, and later to names of trees and flowers.
- **Diagonal Avenues:** Named after states and cut across the grid, often creating traffic circles and unique intersections.

For example, if you are looking for 1700 P St., NW, it's located where P Street intersects 17th Street in the Northwest quadrant.

Public Transportation Options

- Metrorail and Metrobus: Operated by WMATA, these are the primary means of public transit in the area. Their website (wmata.com) offers route maps, schedules, and a Trip Planner tool that helps you determine the best routes and times for your trips. The Nextbus app can be handy for realtime bus arrival updates.
- UPass Program: American University provides a
 UPass to full-time students for \$136 per semester
 (fall and spring), allowing unlimited travel on
 Metrorail and Metrobus during the school year,
 with the exception of winter break. Details are
 available on American University's transportation
 website.



- MARC Train Service: The Maryland Area Regional Commuter (MARC) connects Washington's Union Station to Baltimore and BWI Airport, providing another way to get around.
- AU Shuttle Service: American University offers a shuttle service daily and picks up at the Tenley Metro station every 12 minutes. The Blue Route will take you directly from Tenley Metro to AU Campus and has a drop off location in front of Kerwin Hall.





Cycling in D.C.


- Capital Bikeshare: A convenient and eco-friendly way to travel around D.C., Capital Bikeshare has over 200 stations across the region. You can pick up a bike from one station and drop it off at another. There are two stations located on Massachusetts and Nebraska Ave, which are both in close proximity to SPA American University students can use the discount code CaBi4AU for membership benefits.
- **Personal Bikes:** For those who prefer to use their own bikes, there are bike racks available on campus at several outdoor locations.

Car Sharing

- Car Rentals: For those who prefer driving, several rental car companies operate from D.C.-area airports, Union Station, and other locations throughout the city.
- **Zipcar:** This is a popular car-sharing service available in high-traffic areas and near Metro stops. It offers cars that can be rented by the hour or day. American University students receive a membership discount.
- Free2Move: Another car-sharing option that allows you to rent cars through an app, providing flexibility to choose vehicles and rental periods.

GETTING AROUND WASHINGTON, D.C.





- **Student Parking:** Student's may purchase a parking pass for the semester or year, or for occasional parking, students can use the Virtual Self Park Code located in the Parking Portal or PayByPhone, rates are \$0.75/hr + \$0.35 (per transaction service fee). To park in all general parking areas on campus through the PayByPhone mobile app, you must use your AU credentials to log in to the Parking Portal and select the "Virtual Self Park Code" option to register your vehicle and obtain the discount code and instructions for use.
 - You must have/use an Affiliated Login to access this code. If you login using a guest account, you will not have the ability to choose this parking option.

WASHINGTON, D.C. GENERAL HOUSING INFORMATION



Types of Housing

- Apartments: A range of styles from studio to multiple bedrooms, range in price, and usually require a 12-month lease.
- Rooms in Private Apartments/Houses: A private homeowner or roommate that leases out a single room, often doesn't have a lease, but get something in writing!!
- **Group Homes:** A landlord owns the home and rents individual rooms, usually have a shared common space/bathrooms along with common space rules, and have a signed renting agreement.
- **Subletting:** You take a place in someone else's apartment while they are gone for a set amount of time, you will have a sublet agreement, either through the individual or leasing office.

• Some questions to consider


- o How much can you truly afford in rent?

- o Do I need a co-signer? Who is willing to do this (parent, grandparent, older sibling, family friend)?


Things to bring with you while touring and applying

- Check book
- Credit card & credit report
- o Previous landlord references
- o Proof of employment and/or proof of student status
- o Identification State ID, social security card, birth certificate, etc...
- **District Zone Parking:** You must purchase a Residential Parking Permit (RPP) to park overnight in zoned street parking by your residence. You may qualify for this reciprocity and the RPP if you are a full-time student at a District college or university. 

D.C. NEIGHBORHOODS: CATHEDRIAL HEIGHTS



DMV NEIGHBORHOODS: CLARENDON, VA


